




Figure 1: Risk Management Process - Overview



Management of stray or wandering dogs and cats

Background

 The proper and effective management of stray and wandering dogs and cats is central to good animal management within a municipality. This contributes to the amenity of both animal owners and the remainder of the community equally.



 Generally, the object should be to ensure compliance with the legislation and Council's orders through community education and a system of counselling and warnings but it will be necessary to take formal action against animal owners for repeat or aggravated offences.



Authority

The following provisions of the Domestic (Feral and Nuisance) Animals Act 1994 relate directly to this issue:

- Dogs and cats on found on private land without permission: section 23
- Particular attention should be paid to the seizure provisions under this section.
- Penalties: not more than one penalty unit for first offence
- Not more than three penalty units for subsequent offences
- Infringement Notice: May be issued



Cats found at large on public land - Section 25

 First ensure that there is a Council Order creating an offence in place and published

Penalties: not more than one penalty unit for first offence

 Not more than three penalty units for subsequent offences



CITY OF

Infringement Notice: May be issued

Dogs and cats found in places specified by Council (Orders) Section 26

- Important to check the exact wording of Council Order which prohibits the presence of dogs and cats or imposes conditions on their presence in a certain place.
- Penalties: Not more than two penalty units for first offence
 - Not more than four penalty units for subsequent offence
- Infringement Notice: May be issued



Minimum Standard

- Investigate complaint
- Impound animal found wandering at large or not securely contained on owners property (section 77)
- Notify owner of impoundment (section 78)
- Apply relevant provisions of the Act



Best Practice Options

- Doorknock the area to establish owner of unidentified animal
- Return animal to owner without impounding with education regarding owners responsibility
- Provide advice regarding appropriate containment measures
- Issue verbal or written warning


